Subject name: British Values and Citizenship KS5

General Statement of Intent

Pebble Brook School is a diverse and multicultural environment that we believe needs celebrating but we are also aware of vulnerabilities of our students however as British Values and Citizenship are important to carry on into 6th Form and lessons will be delivered in a diverse manor to meet these needs.

The sessions teach students about what it means to be a citizen in modern and diverse Britain; valuing our community and celebrating our differences. We put a lot of focus on respect and tolerance so that students with staff's support can create a culture where everyone feels happy and valued.
